Minute No. 193/25

Presidential Elections – proposed special meeting and nominations

Acting Director of Services, Joanna Kelly, provided an overview of the framework for the upcoming Presidential Election as outlined in the Presidential Order signed by Minister Browne on 3rd September.

It was confirmed that 27 prospective candidates are currently seeking presidential nomination from Louth County Council. Members were advised of the importance of securing Council agreement on the next steps, including:

- Whether to convene a Special Meeting to consider potential candidates who have sought the Council's support for nomination
- The proposed format of such a meeting
- The voting process by which a nomination may be made, should the Council choose to support a candidate.

On the **Proposal of Cllr Pearse McGeough, Seconded by Cllr Ciaran Fisher**, it was agreed that voting on the matter would require a simple majority of 50% plus one.

Standing Orders were suspended to enable a short recess.

Following the recess, and on the **Proposal of Cllr Emma Coffey, Seconded by Cllr Kevin Callan**, it was agreed that, to be considered as a potential nominee, each candidate must secure the support of two elected members of Louth County Council (a proposer and a seconder) by close of business on Tuesday, 16th September 2025. Each Councillor may only propose and second one candidate.

It was further agreed that candidates who receive the requisite support will be invited to present at an in-person only Special Meeting of Council, to be scheduled for Monday, 22nd September at 6:30 p.m. In advance of the Special Meeting candidates must confirm their eligibility and submit a 300-word statement by close of business on Friday, 19th September 2025. Cllr Kevin Meenan, expressed general support for the proposed approach but suggested that candidates be asked to submit the required documents earlier to allow staff sufficient time to prepare and circulate materials to Members by close of business on Friday.

Chief Executive, David Conway presented the Annual Service Delivery Plan 2025 – Mid-Year Progress Update and invited comments and observations from Members. Councillor Nash welcomed the report and acknowledged the level of detail it contained.

On foot of queries raised by Cllrs Yore, McQuillan, and Nash, Ms Kelly undertook to provide Members with a note detailing the process for appointing individuals to the group's remaining membership places, along with clarification regarding replacement appointments should the need arise over the three-year term.

Nuclear Free Local Authorities Membership

Acting Director of Services, Joanna Kelly, informed Members that the 2025/2026 invoice from Manchester City Council, in the amount of £1,283, had been received in respect of the annual membership fee for the UK/Ireland Nuclear Free Local Authorities network. Ms Kelly noted that the membership appears to predate 2014.

Records indicate that, in 2015, Manchester City Council was formally advised that the Town Council of Dundalk and the Borough Council of Drogheda had been dissolved, and that Louth County Council had assumed responsibility as the successor authority for all local government functions. The correspondence further requested clarification regarding the benefits of continued affiliation with the organisation. However, no response appears to have been received, despite the membership fee being paid annually since that time.

In light of the absence of any correspondence outlining the ongoing advantages of membership, and the continued payment of the fee over an extended period, Ms Kelly recommended that Members consider the appropriateness of maintaining the Council's affiliation with the body.

Following some discussion, it was proposed that the matter be tabled for decision at the October Monthly Meeting to allow time for further research to inform considerations.

Section 141 Reports 2024 – Compliance with Section 141 of the Local Government Act, 2001 as amended

The Cathaoirleach reminded members of the four-minute rule for matters arising from the Chief Executive Report.

Finance and System Support

The following was highlighted in relation to Finance and System Support:

- Options in respect to the upgrading/development of a new website are currently being explored with a view to implementing same following the rollout of the new CRM system.
- Any delays in responses to CRM cases should be addressed to the relevant Directorates.

Economic Delivery

- The Tain Trail Draft Service Level Agreement has been circulated to the five participating Counties and agreed in principle.
- The Louth Tourism Strategy is currently in its draft stage and, subject to SPC approval, may be brought forward for Council approval in October.
- Louth and Meath were successful in their joint application to Failte Ireland for funding under the "Home of Halloween" theme. This will provide promotional funding for the Lú Festival of Light as well as Púca and Meath's Sámhain Festival.
- Members congratulated the Team on a very successful Heritage Week
- Funding was approved under the Irish Walled Towns Network and the tender process has commenced.
- Any business which avails of the Shop Front Grant must adhere with the relevant guidelines. The Planning Enforcement Team will investigate any shop front signs which do not adhere to planning guidelines.
- Variation Number 3 of the County Development Plan is legally required following the zoning changes agreed to the Dundalk Local Area Plan in March.
- Cllr MhicConchoille thanked the Economic Delivery Team for their assistance with the "Born to Run" half marathon which took place last week along the greenway from Newry to Carlingford.
- The report commissioned on Carlingford Lough Ferry is in the final stages and will be circulated in due course.
- Planning permission is required for a change of use where, for example, a commercial unit is being repurposed for residential use. However, permission is not required when there is a change in the type of retail venture. A review of the density of certain types of businesses could be considered during the preparation of the next County Development Plan
- Cllr Fisher requested that the Revenue Commissioners to be invited to speak with Members on various issues relating to financial compliance and investigative procedures.

Operations and Environment Delivery

The following was noted in relation to Operations and Environment Delivery:

- Councillor Minogue requested that a meeting of relevant stakeholders be convened to discuss the reopening of Dunleer Railway Station. The Cathaoirleach advised that the matter should first be raised by way of a Notice of Motion.
- The rollout of CCTV at litter blackspots was discussed. Acting Director of Service David Hanratty advised that the system is acting as a deterrent, with zero detections recorded at the current installation points. He further noted that an impact assessment is carried out for each proposed location and that the initiative is part of a rolling programme. The CCTV locations will be publicised through advertisements in the local newspapers.
- Councillor Watters queried whether any plans were in place to address the necessary road repairs at Shelling Hill following the flooding in 2023. It was confirmed that the Executive had written to the OPW seeking funding for the repairs; however, as no properties were damaged or flooded, the OPW declined to provide funding. The Operations Team is not currently aware of any alternative funding sources.
- Maintenance and security issues at Muirhevnamor Park were discussed, particularly in light of the new athletics track due for completion in the near future. The reinstatement of CCTV in the park will be reviewed in consultation with the relevant Directorate.

- Gully cleaning was discussed, and the question was raised as to whether the Council could purchase a dedicated gully cleaning machine. The Team review such operations regularly and any purchase would be reliant on funding being available.
- The introduction of time-limit signage on disabled parking bays was welcomed, with a request that it be rolled out county-wide in coordination with traffic wardens. It was noted that traffic wardens fall under the remit of the Finance Directorate.
- Members congratulated the Civil Defence and National Ambulance Service for providing a regional CFR training day and welcomed John Madden back to Louth Fire and Rescue Service to his new role as Assistant Chief Fire Officer.
- The Mattress Amnesty took place in early September and was considered a success; however, it was suggested that it may have achieved greater participation had it been held on a Saturday rather than a weekday. Both the scheduling and the €4 entrance fee will be reviewed ahead of next year's event.
- The number of litter detections and Fixed Penalty Notices (FPNs) issued was highlighted and commended. The reported dumping of litter at Chapel Street will be investigated by the wardens.
- A number of MUGAs in the Dundalk area—specifically Marian Park, Mullaharlin, and Lios Dubh—require maintenance. It was suggested that the MUGA in Oldbridge be reinstated, as it could serve as a valuable resource for residents and local sports clubs.
- Parking at the rear of the Museum has been reduced since the opening of the VARCITIES project, with access to the area governed by an agreement with a number of businesses. A review can be undertaken to ensure that the parking spaces are being used by authorised businesses and not by customers.
- Members welcomed the launch of the new CIS scheme and envisaged a large number of applications
- Cover for School Wardens who require time off will be reviewed with the Roads Engineer and the Road Safety Officer.
- Uisce Éireann will be contacted regarding the works carried out at The Dale in Drogheda and will be requested to reinstate the affected area following recent emergency works.
- It was confirmed that temporary General Operatives are required to have full driving licences to enable flexibility in assigning work.
- Cllr McGuinness raised the issue of traffic congestion at the Sextons Road Junction and suggested that the bus route be extended into Haggardstown. It was noted that the extension of the Western Relief Road between the Marlbog Road and Wuxi are outside the remit of the Operations directorate but may be suited for consideration in the context of the Local Area Plan.
- Two blocked gullies at the front of the school in Blackrock will be reviewed by the Operations Team
- Issues with weeds and removal of weeds / sediment will be review by the Operations Team.
- With particular reference to Francis Street, the issue of Hackney taxi's stopping traffic to pick up passengers was highlighted as a concern to be addressed. Operations also noted that it is in ongoing discussion with the Courts Services in respect to issues arising with the Prison Service parking at the Court House impacting accessibility of the taxi rank at the Square and causing further traffic congestion. Operations will continue to review options.
- The dumping of diesel sludge will be referred to the Gardaí for investigation in connection with suspected fuel laundering activities.
- Cllr Reilly raised the playground in Coulter Place which Mr Hanratty committed to responding to separately.
- In response to issues raised by Cllr Ford, the number of bins in Termonfeckin will be reviewed in addition to increasing Dog Fouling Awareness in the area.

HR, Corporate and Community Delivery

The following was highlighted in relation to HR, Corporate and Community Delivery:

- Acting Director of Service Joanna Kelly will review toilet facilities at Clogherhead and revert to Members with an update.

Housing and Culture Delivery

The following was highlighted in relation to Housing and Culture Delivery:

- The rising level of rent arrears was discussed in detail, including the underlying causes and potential solutions. Director of Services, Ger Murphy, confirmed that addressing arrears is a key priority for the Housing Team. He further indicated that tenants are encouraged to contact MABS to assist them with payment of arrears.
- The issue of emergency accommodation arising from domestic violence was discussed. While pressures within the sector are acknowledged, it was noted that strong collaborative practices exist among all relevant bodies.
- Responsibility for pest control in social lies with the tenant.
- Mr Murphy clarified the figures reported in the Chief Executive's Report in relation to Housing First.
- The EERP programme is currently underway and making good progress. An update will be provided to Members in due course
- Regarding Vacant Property applications, no breakdown is currently available distinguishing between proposed owner-occupier and rental types.
- In relation to Local Authority Home Loans, it was outlined that the Council conducts rigorous assessments of applicants' affordability and repayment capacity.
- Members extended their congratulations to the Team involved in the new Affordable Housing Scheme in Ardee. It was confirmed that the communication plan for the scheme will begin this week, with the application portal expected to open mid to late October.
- It was reported that the CALF housing scheme on the Dublin Road, opposite the hospital, has been completed and, as such, was not included in the Chief Executive's Report.

Major Capital Projects and Infrastructure Delivery

The following was highlighted in relation to Major Capital Projects and Infrastructure Delivery:

- Director of Services, David Jones, clarified the matter regarding the appointment of Design Consultants for Carlingford advising that the RPS Group was responsible for the initial design and Part VIII, while Urban Agency has recently been appointed to carry out the detailed design phase of the project in order to be project ready when future calls for applications for capital funding under RRDF is announced .
- It was confirmed that Health Checks had recently been completed for Collon and Castlebellingham, carried out as desk top exercises. The Health Checks represent a precursor to the development of any future Town Centre First plans which will be subject to full public consultation.
- Senior Engineer, John O'Hagan, provided an update on the Mell/ Slane Road junction upgrade advising that the initial design will be made available to Members on completion. A decision remains to be made on whether the upgrade works should proceed independently of the Active Travel programme.
- Members commended the St Nicholas Quarter regeneration scheme, recognising it as an excellent example of successful collaboration among stakeholders, residents and businesses.

It was confirmed that additional areas within Dundalk Town Centre will be considered for future regeneration initiatives.

- €500,000 has been allocated in 2025 under the Bus Enhancement Programme for the upgrade of bus stops in various locations across the county.
- It is anticipated that the emerging preferred route corridor for the Dundalk Bay to Carlingford Greenway will be published in late October/early November. Letters will be issued to affected landowners in the first instance prior to publication, while a briefing for the Dundalk MD members will be arranged during the same period.

In this regard, that this Council calls on the Minister for Finance, the Minister for Health and Ireland's Members of the European Parliament to urgently examine the reduction or removal of VAT on sunscreen products with SPF 30 or higher, to make them more affordable and accessible to the public. Furthermore, this Council commits to piloting the installation of free sunscreen dispensers at all Blue Flag beaches in County Louth and in key public buildings, including County Hall, Dundalk and Fair Street, Drogheda, by Summer 2026 as part of a wider public awareness campaign on skin cancer prevention."

The proposal to advocate for the reduction or removal of VAT on sunscreen products is a matter for the Elected Members.

Louth County Council does not provide sunscreen dispensers at its facilities at this time however is aware that there is a pilot scheme in place with a small number of local authorities.

We will await the findings from these pilot schemes including the costings for the provision of such dispensers and sunscreen.

“Louth County Council expresses it's dismay and opposition to the Government's intention to abolish the Triple Lock, which governs the deployment of Irish Defence Forces personnel overseas.

The Triple Lock has ensured that Ireland's participation in overseas missions (with more than 12 defence personnel) would always require approval from:

1. The Cabinet
2. Dáil Éireann and
3. That the mission they are being deployed on would have a UN mandate either from the Security Council or the General Assembly.

In 2001, the Irish people rejected the Nice Treaty over concerns that it would drag Ireland into EU military structures that would threaten our neutrality. To get the electorate to approve the EU Treaty, the government with the agreement of the other EU Member States, through a "solemn declaration" introduced the Triple Lock. This Declaration was reiterated following initial rejection of the subsequent Lisbon Treaty.

Therefore this Council rejects government plans to abolish or amend the Triple Lock, considering the proposal signifies a breach of trust with the Irish electorate and a serious diminution of Irish neutrality”.

Members proposed an amendment to the Motion put forward by Cllr Antoin Watters that

“an attempt to abolish the triple lock was a matter for the people of Ireland and as such should be the subject of a referendum. This motion should also be circulated to the Taoiseach, Tánaiste and the Minister for Justice”. The amendment was

“Salterstown Pier has experienced a consistent increase in popularity among sea-swimmers over recent years. Unfortunately, there has been a notable rise in reported incidents to the Coastguard involving swimmers encountering difficulties. This trend underscores the need for enhanced safety protocols at the Pier.

In response, I am calling on Louth County Council to promptly convene a strategic meeting involving key stakeholders, including representatives from Louth County Council, local branches of Water Safety Ireland, the Irish Coast Guard and other relevant agencies. The objective is to assess current safety measures and identify additional precautions that can be implemented to ensure the safety of all visitors and swimmers at Salterstown Pier”.

Reply from David Hanratty, A/Director of Services, Operations and Environment Delivery

Salterstown is not a designated bathing water under the Bathing Water Quality Regulations 2008 and Bathing Water Quality (Amendment) Regulations 2024 and as such Louth County Council has

no remit carry out interventions to encourage swimming at this location. Members of the public are encouraged to Swim at designated bathing waters.

In order to nominate it as such please note our ongoing annual process that allows members of the public or community groups to nominate a beach for designation. This nomination process is open until September 26th, 2025.
