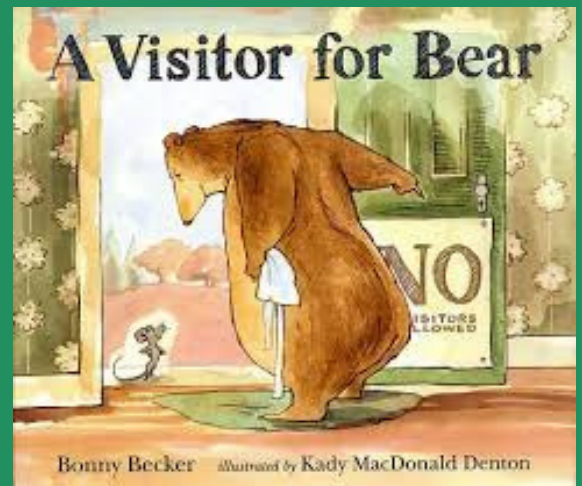

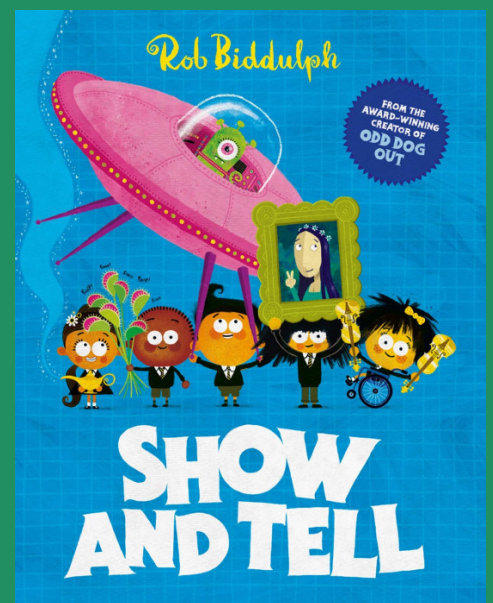
A Visitor for Bear *by Bonny Becker*

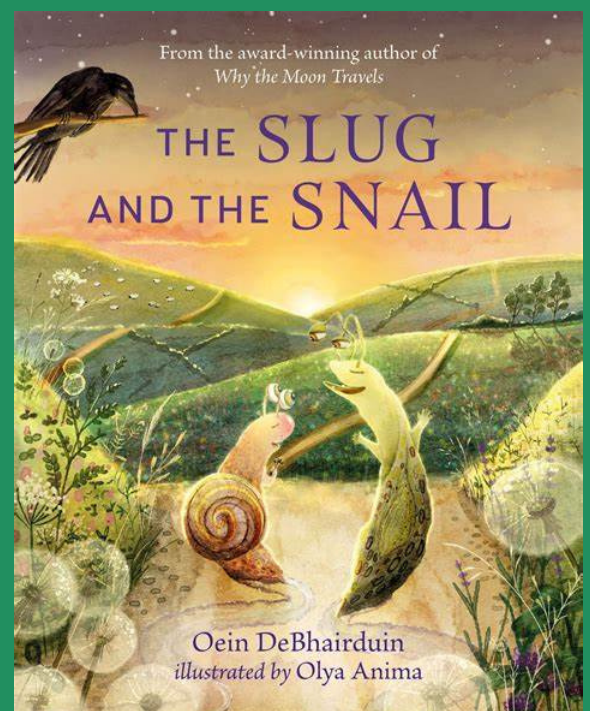
One Snowy Night *by Nick Butterworth*

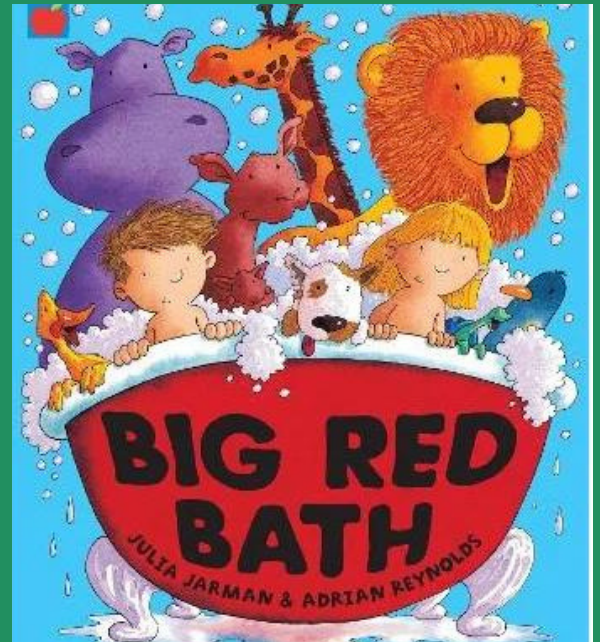

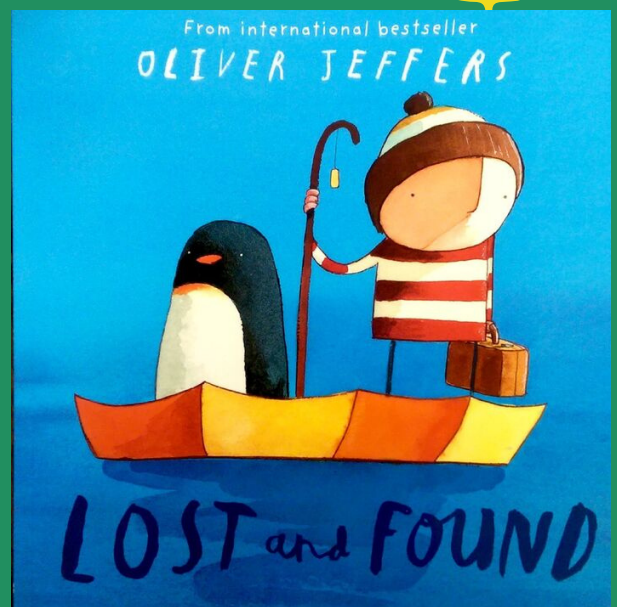

Lost and Found *by Oliver Jeffers*

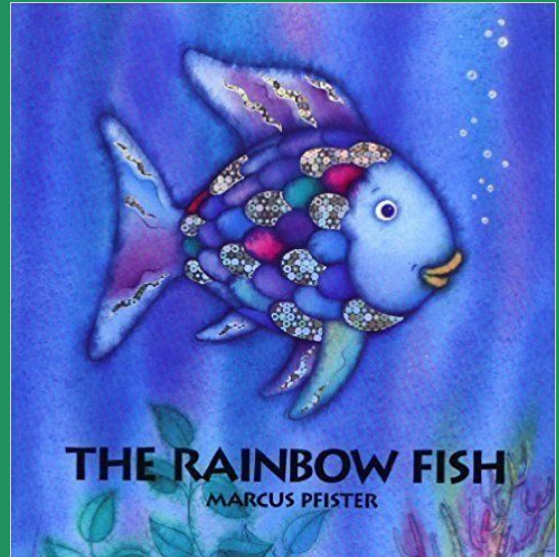

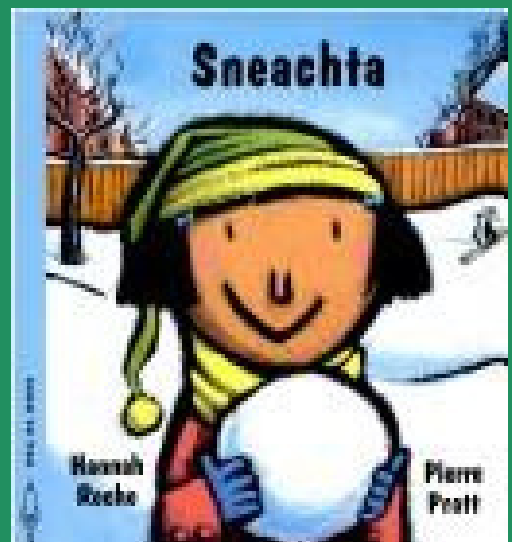
The Rainbow Fish *by Marcus Pfister*

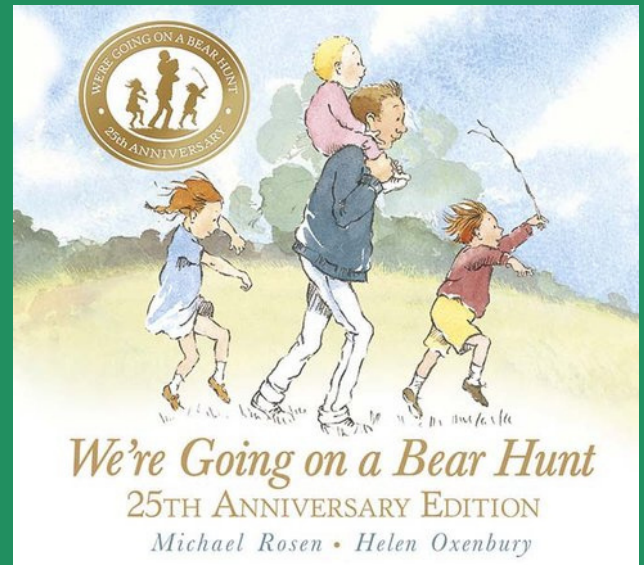
Why go on a walk, when you can go on a bear hunt?

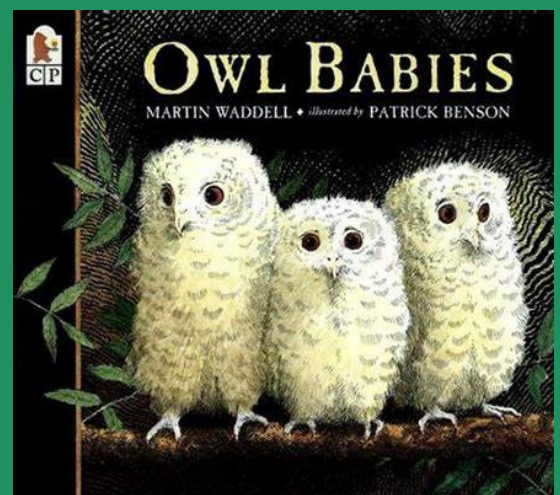
We're going to catch a big one.

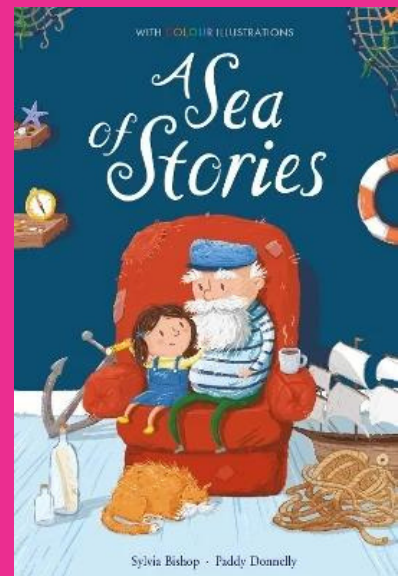

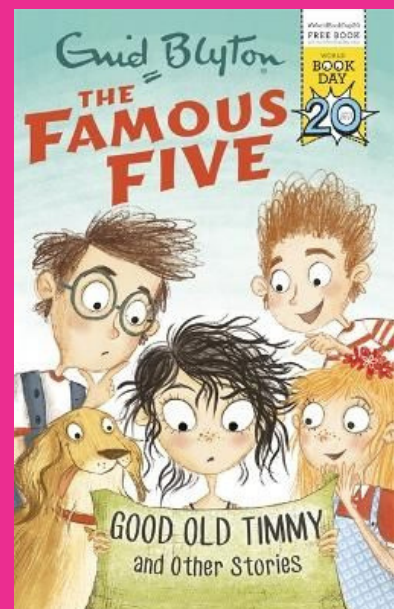
A Sea of Stories *by Sylvia Bishop*

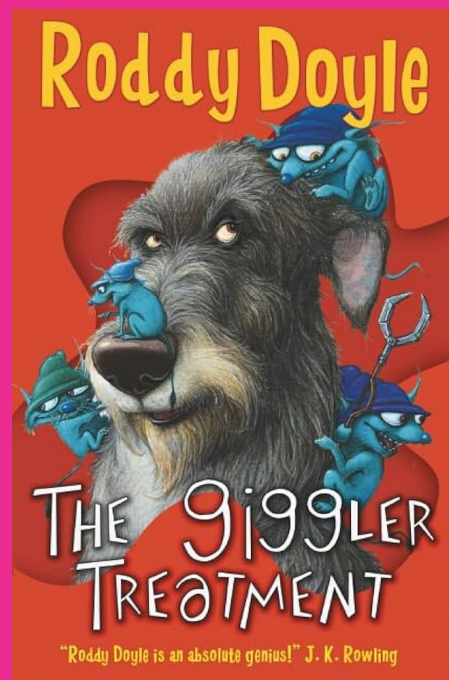
Mariella Queen of the Skies *by Eoin Colfer*

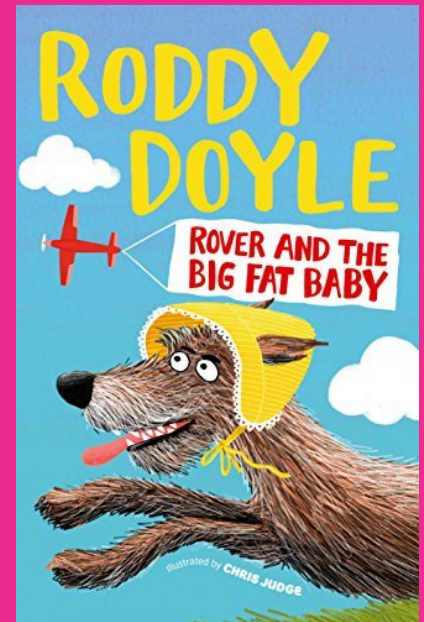

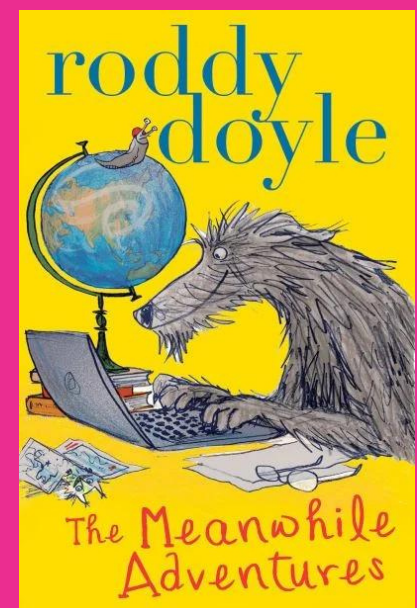

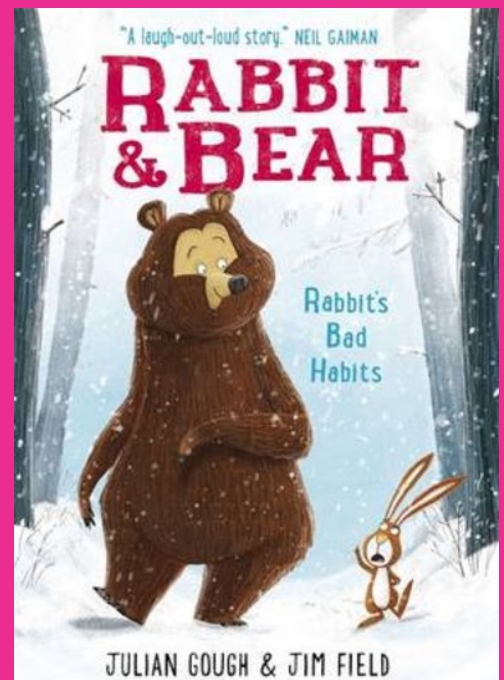
The Adventures of Alfie Onion *by Vivian French*

Rabbit & Bear: Rabbit's Bad Habits *by Julian Gough*

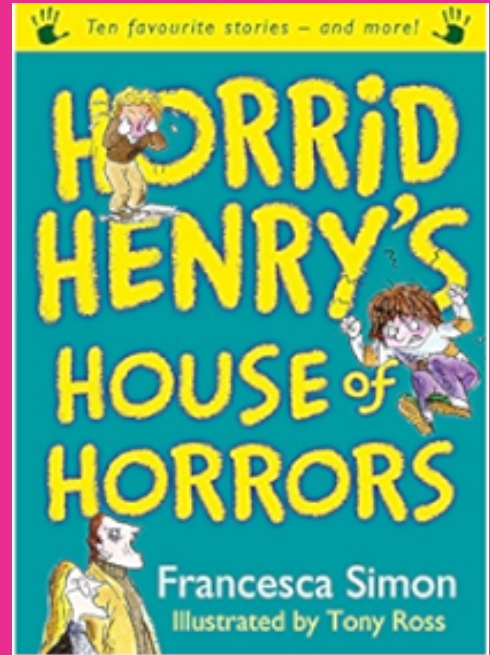

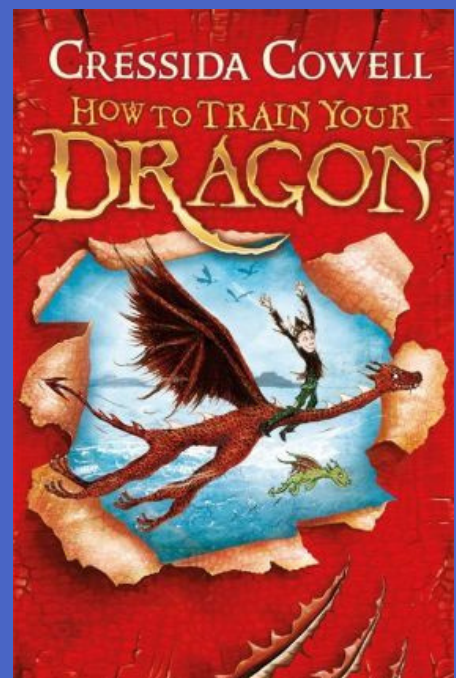
Artemis Fowl: The Seventh Dwarf *by Eoin Colfer*

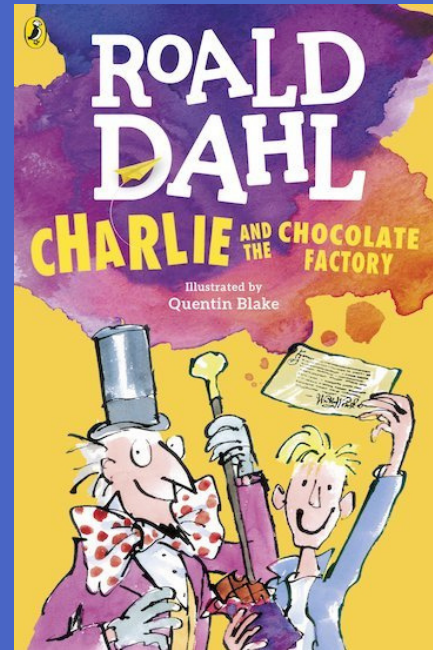

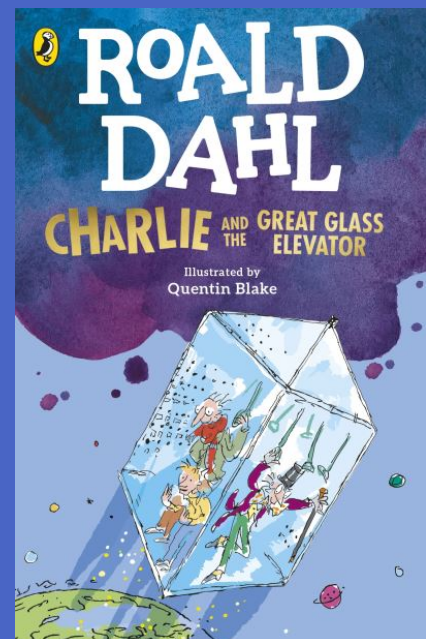
Charlie and the Chocolate Factory *by Roald Dahl*

Charlie and the Great Glass Elevator *by Roald Dahl*

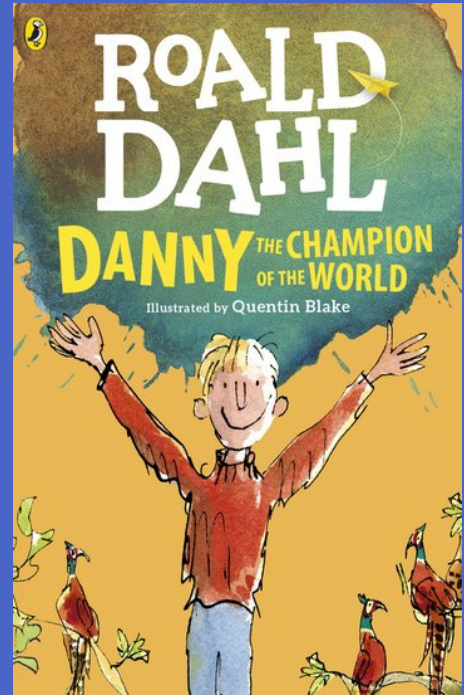

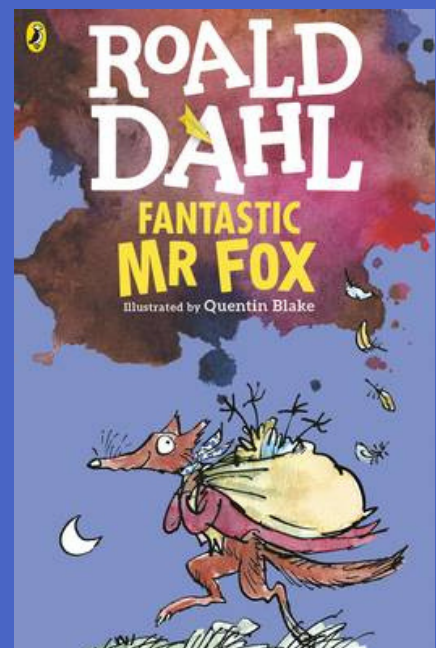
Danny the Champion of the World *by Roald Dahl*

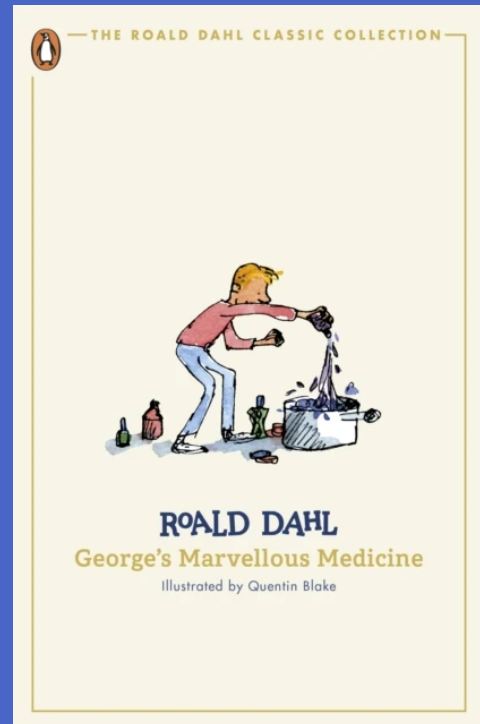

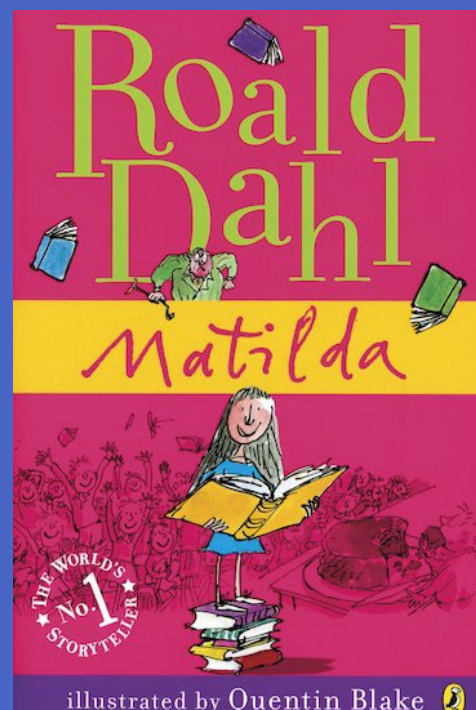

Matilda *by Roald Dahl*



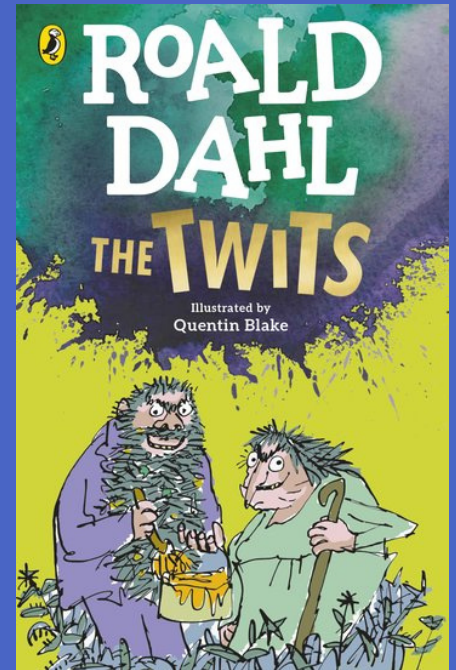

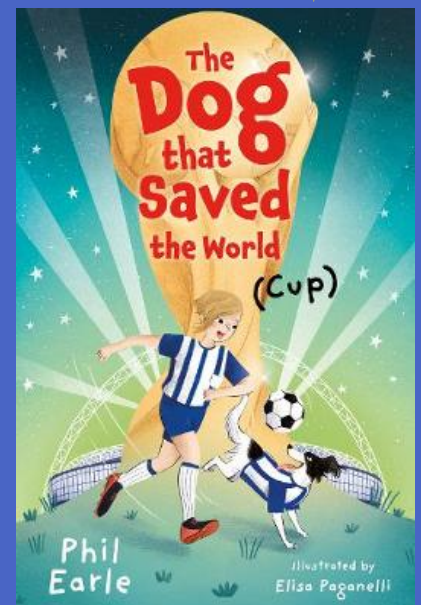
The Twits *by Roald Dahl*

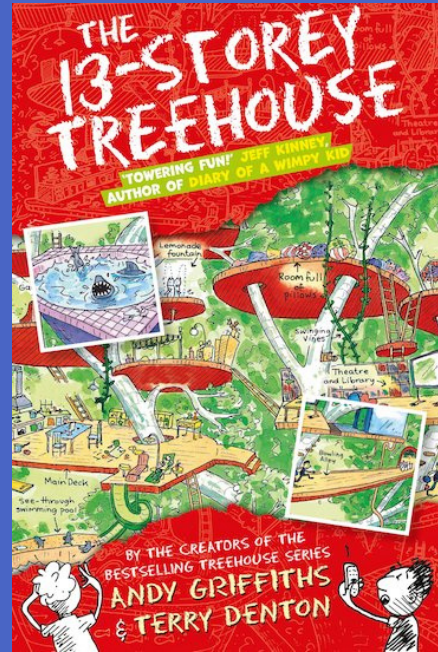

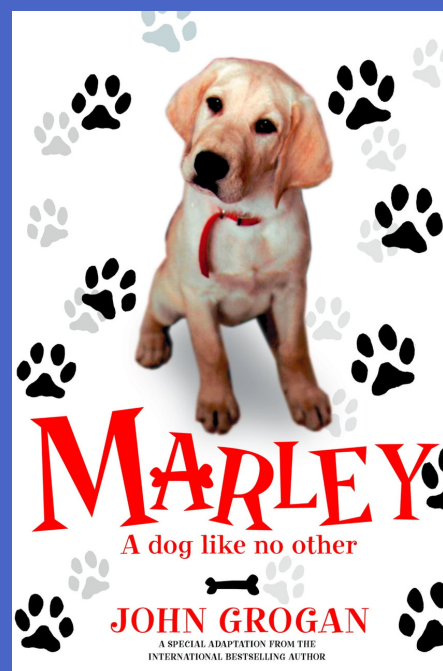

Marley: A Dog Like No Other *by John Grogan*

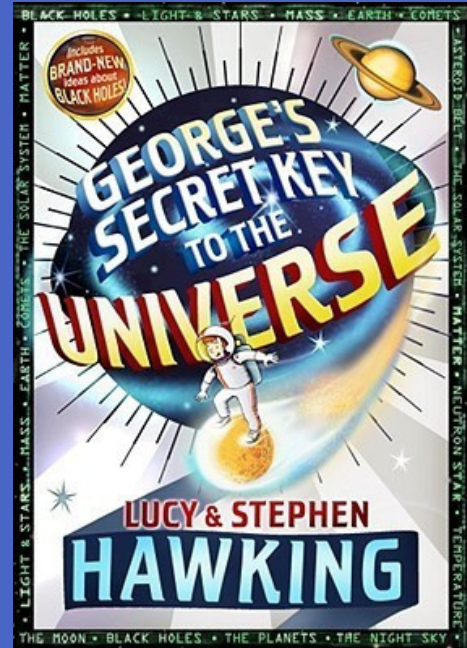

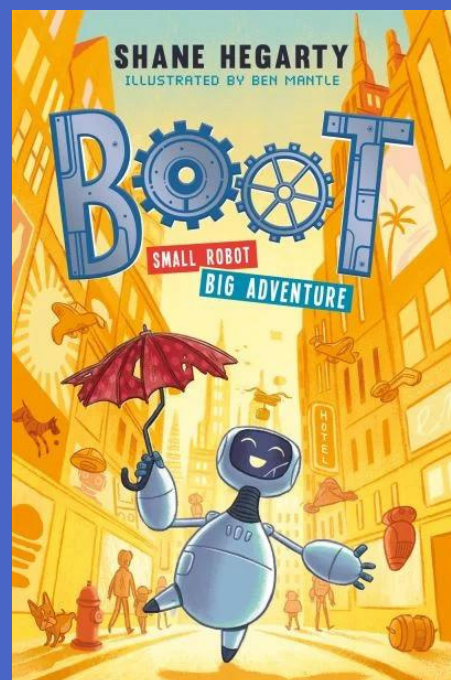
George's Secret Key to the Universe *by Lucy & Stephen Hawking*

Boot *by Shane Hegarty*

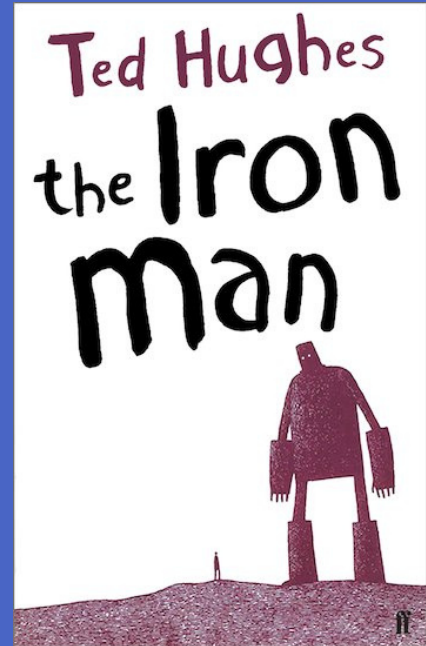

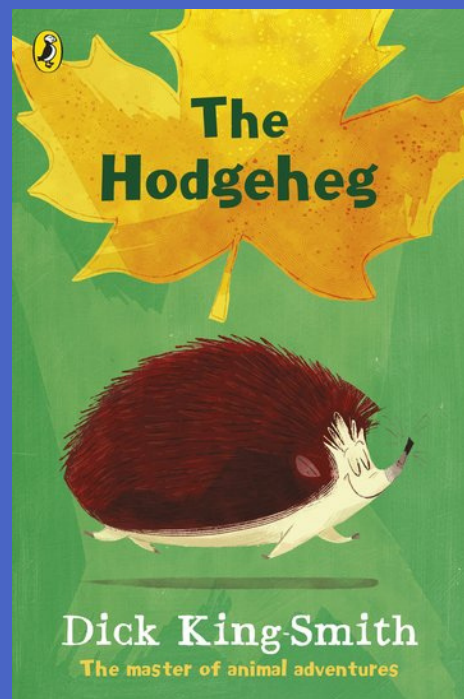
The Iron Man *by Ted Hughes*

The Hodgehog *by Dick King-Smith*

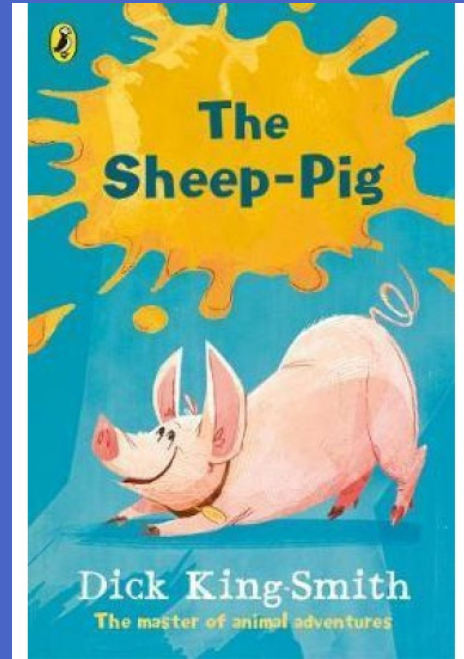

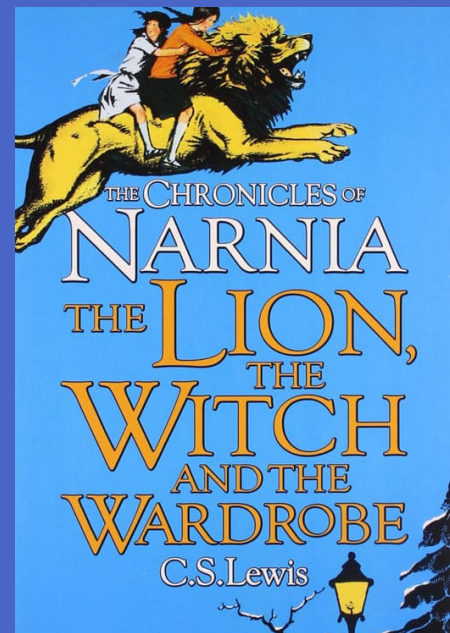
The Sheep-Pig *by Dick King-Smith*

The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe *by C.S. Lewis*

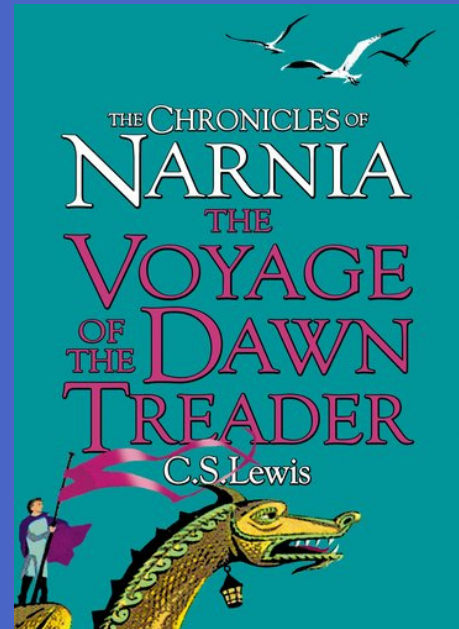

The Voyage of the Dawn Treader *by C.S. Lewis*

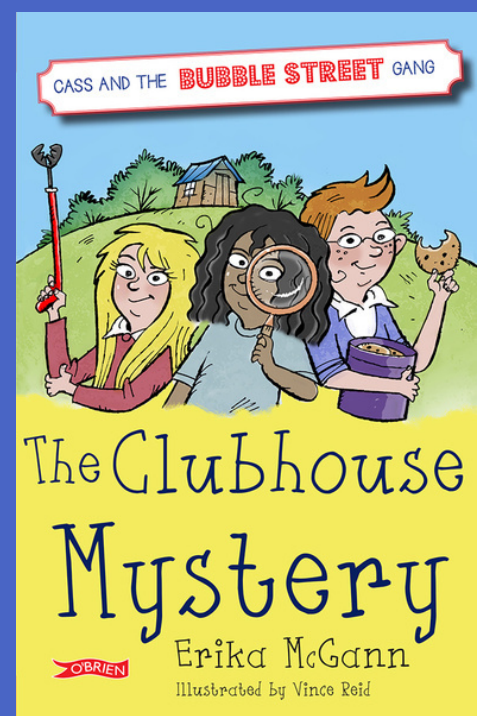

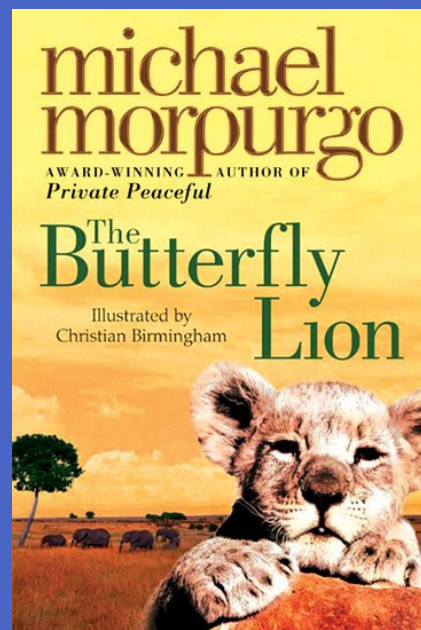
Making Millions *by Erika McGann*

The Butterfly Lion *by Michael Morpurgo*

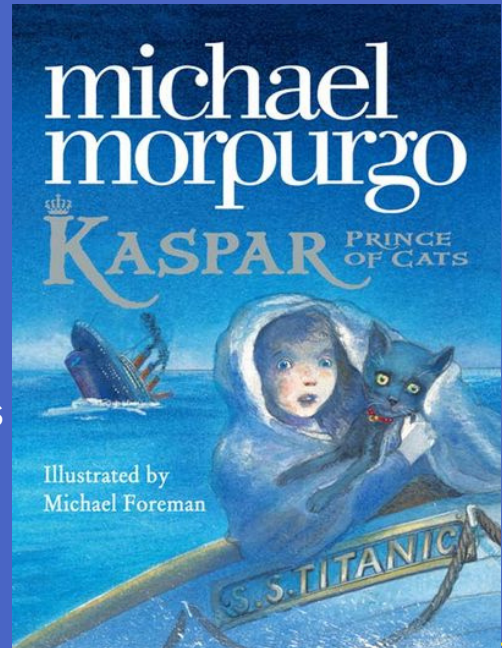

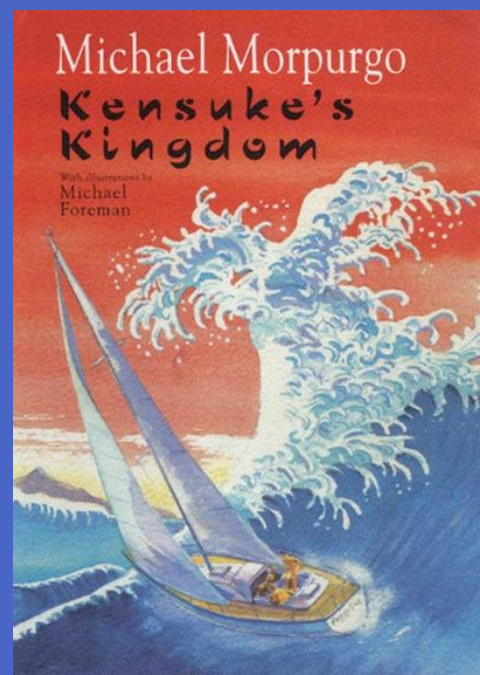
Kaspar: Prince of Cats *by Michael Morpurgo*

Kensuke's Kingdom *by Michael Morpurgo*

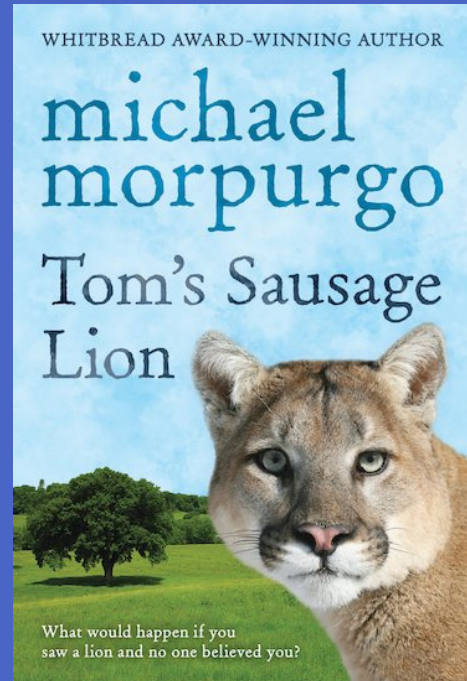

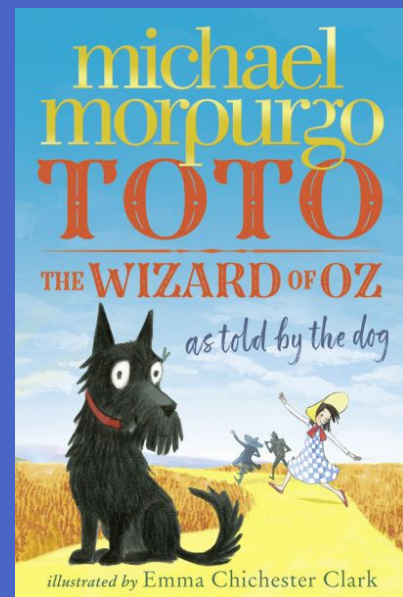
Tom's Sausage Lion *by Michael Morpurgo*

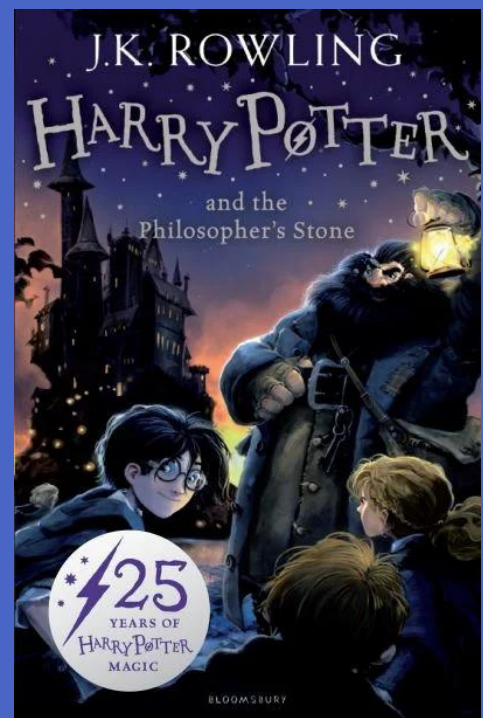
The Borrowers *by Mary Norton*

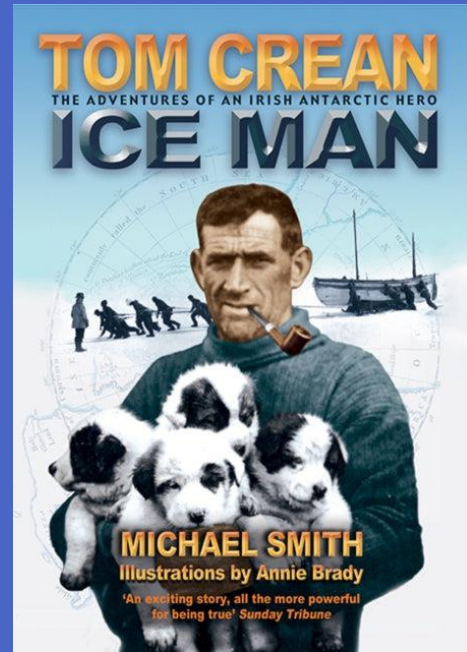

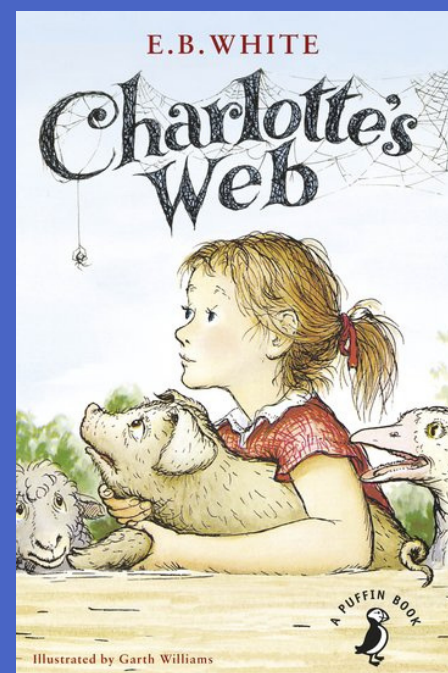
Tom Crean Ice Man *by Michael Smith*

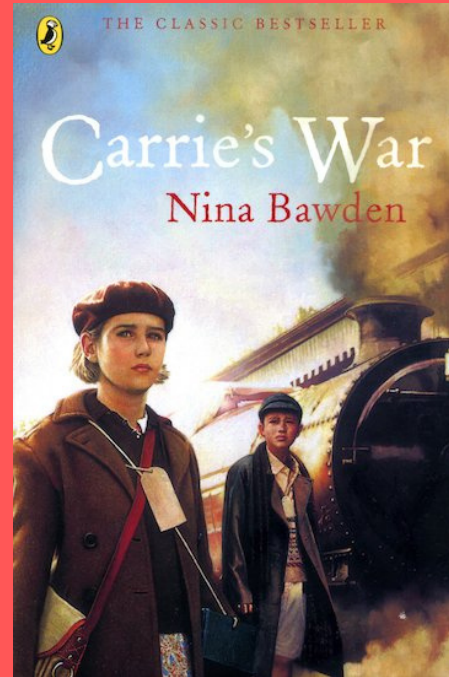

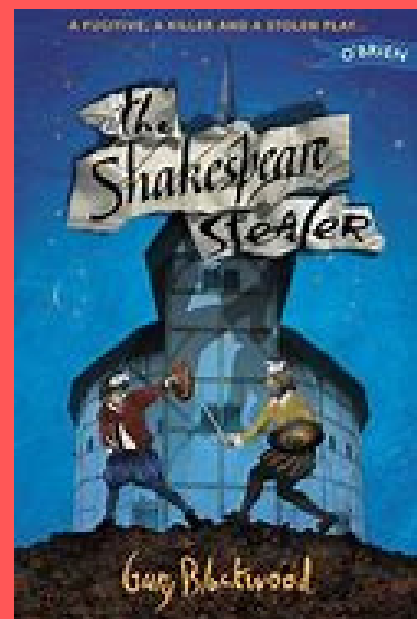
Carrie's War *by Nina Bawden*

The Shakespeare Stealer *by Guy Blackwood*

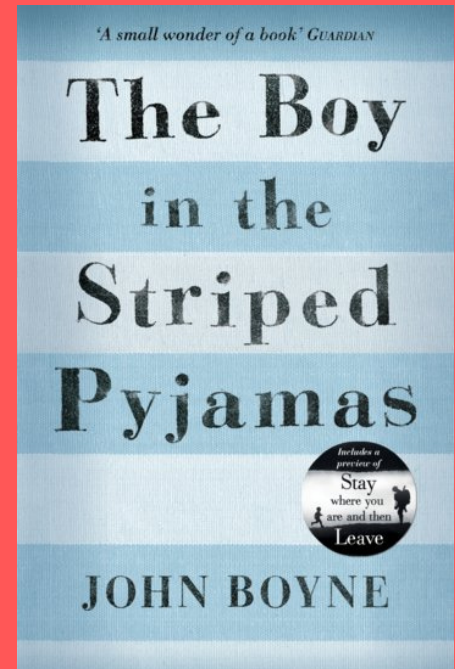

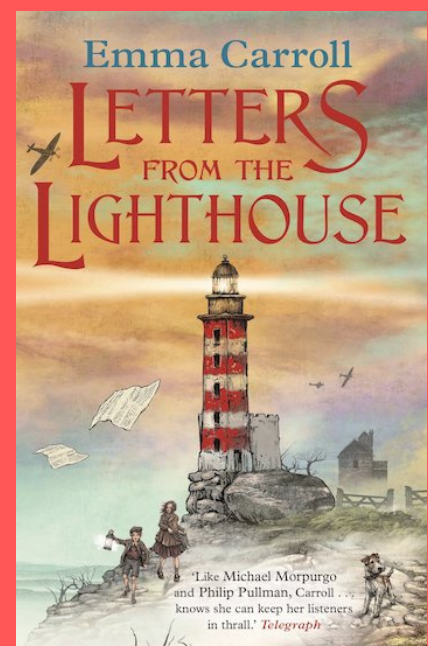
The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas *by John Boyne*

Letters from the Lighthouse *by Emma Carroll*

In February 1941, twelve-year-old Olive Bradshaw and her brother Cliff are evacuated from London to the Devon coast due to bombing raids. They stay with Mr. Ephraim, a reluctant lighthouse keeper. Olive tries to be helpful by delivering letters to the villagers, imagining them as secret messages. She harbors a secret: her older sister Sukie went missing in an air raid, and Olive is determined to find out what happened. When Olive discovers a coded note linking Sukie to Devon, she realizes it involves something dark and dangerous.

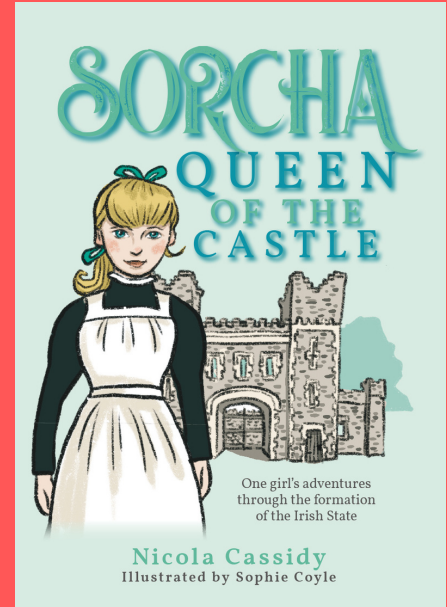

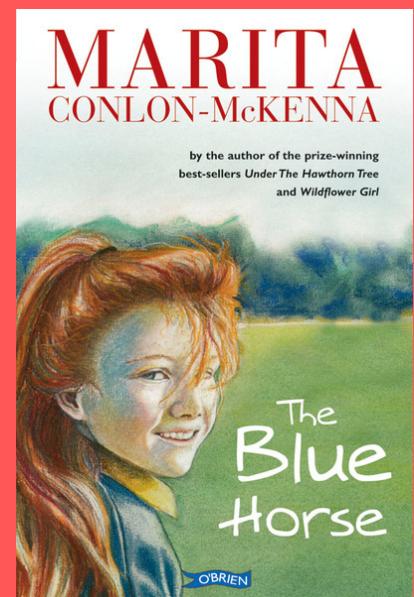


The Blue Horse *by Marita Conlon-McKenna*

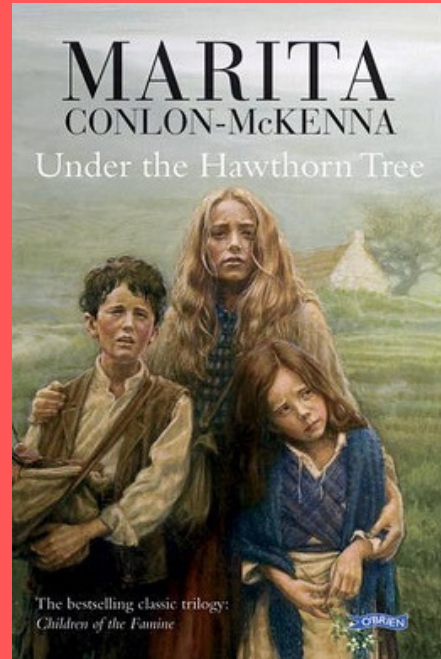

Under the Hawthorn Tree *by Marita Conlon-McKenna*

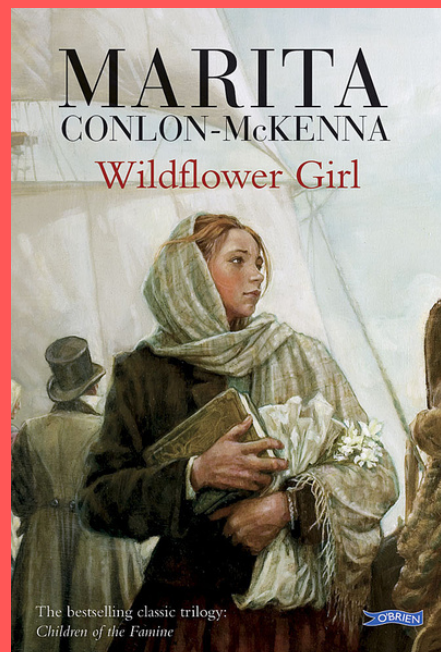

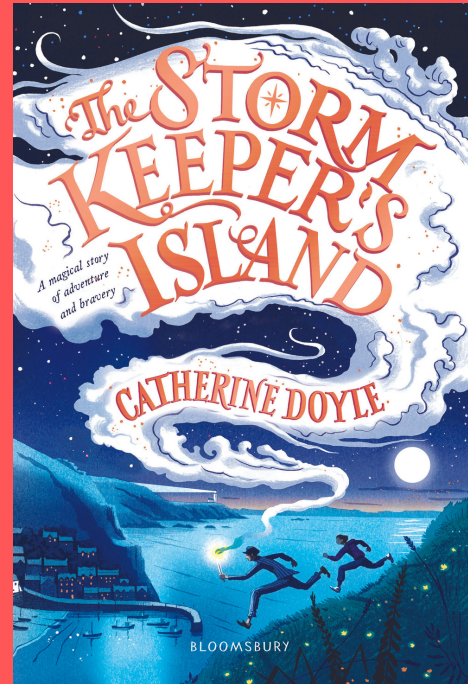

Katie's War: A Story of the Irish Civil War *by Aubrey Flegg*

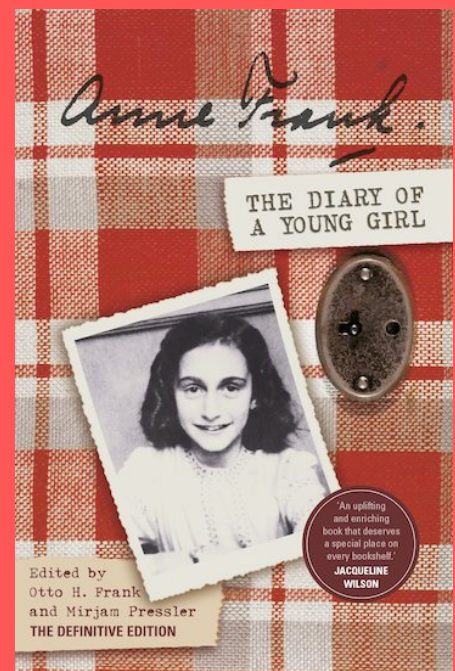

Now, four years later he has more or less recovered, but another war is breaking out, this time at home in Ireland. The Treaty with the British has been signed by Michael Collins, but many disagree with it and want to continue the war for full independence. The country is on the brink of civil war. There are divided loyalties in Kate's family, and she has to choose whom she will support.



The Diary of a Young Girl *by Anne Frank*

In the summer of 1942, fleeing the horrors of the Nazi occupation, Anne Frank and her family were forced into hiding in the back of an Amsterdam warehouse.

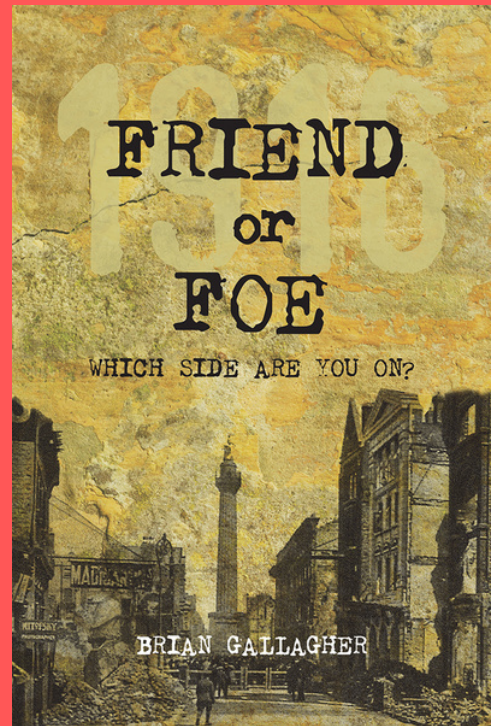
Aged thirteen, Anne kept a diary of her time in the secret annexe. She movingly revealed how the eight people living under these extraordinary conditions coped with hunger, the daily threat of discovery and death and isolation from the outside world.

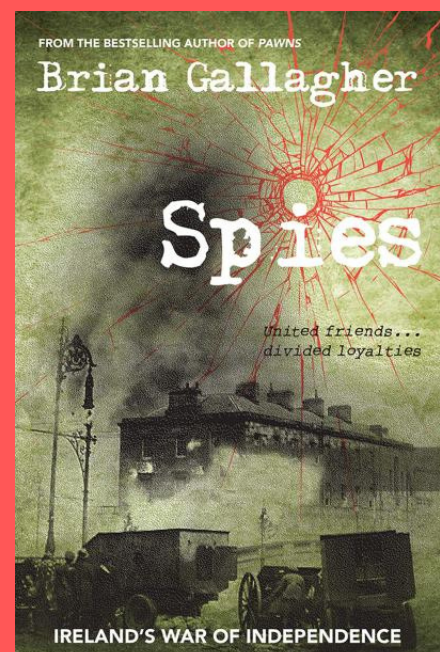
Friend or Foe: 1916 Which side are you on? *by Brian Gallagher*

Spies *by Brian Gallagher*

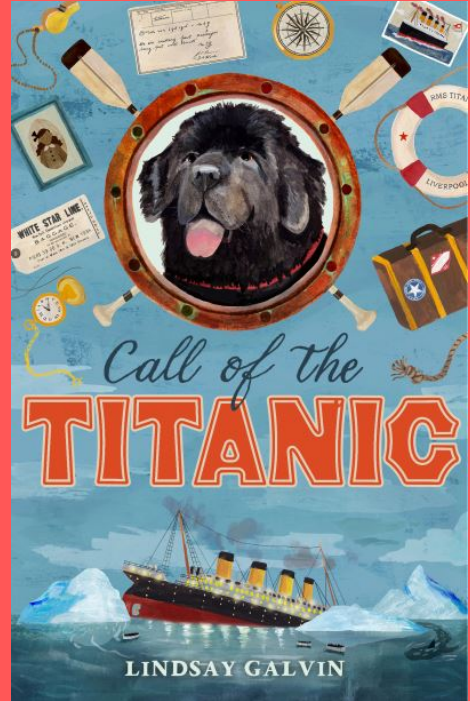

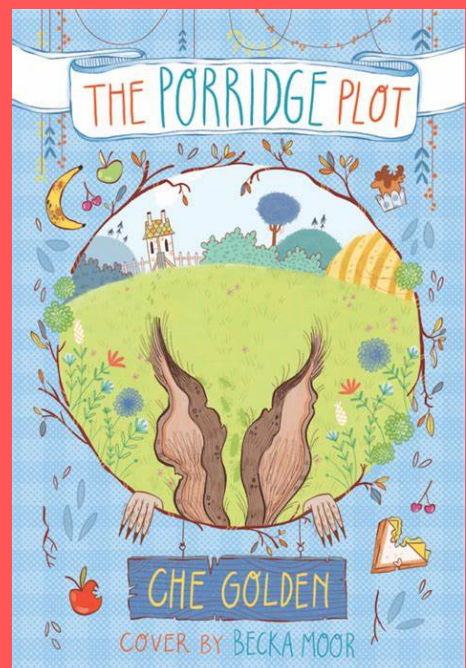
Call of the Titanic *by Lindsay Galvin*

The Porridge Plot *by Che Golden*

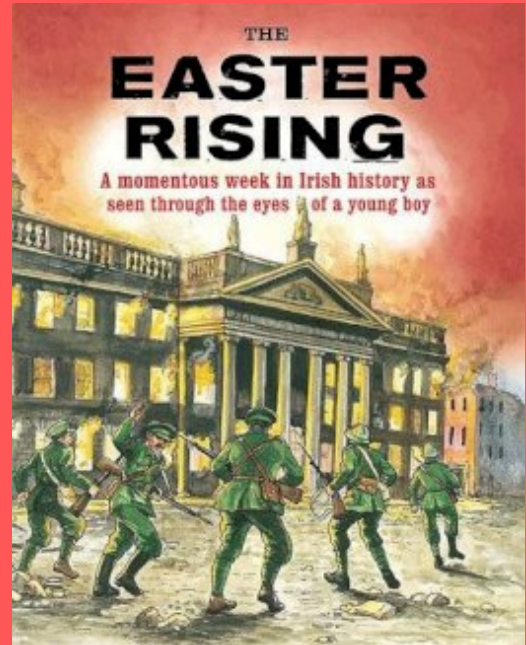

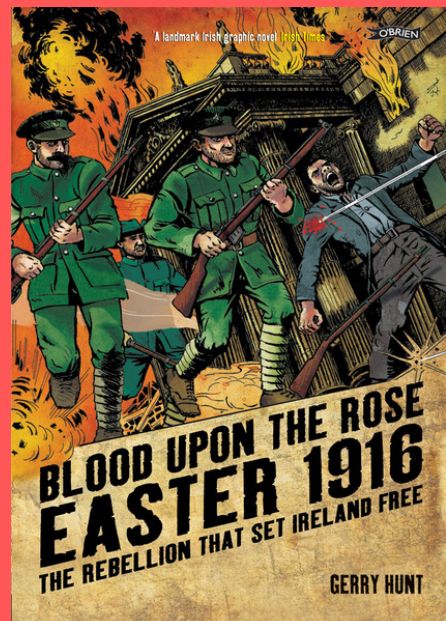
The Easter Rising *by Pat Hegarty*

Blood upon the Rose: Easter 1916 *by Gerry Hunt*

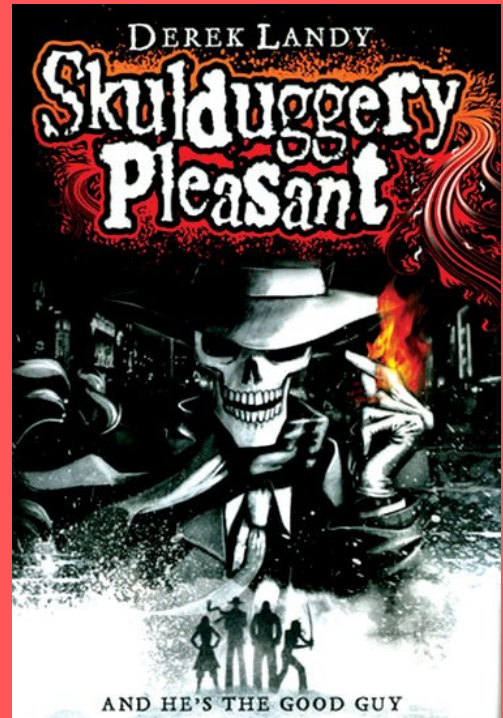

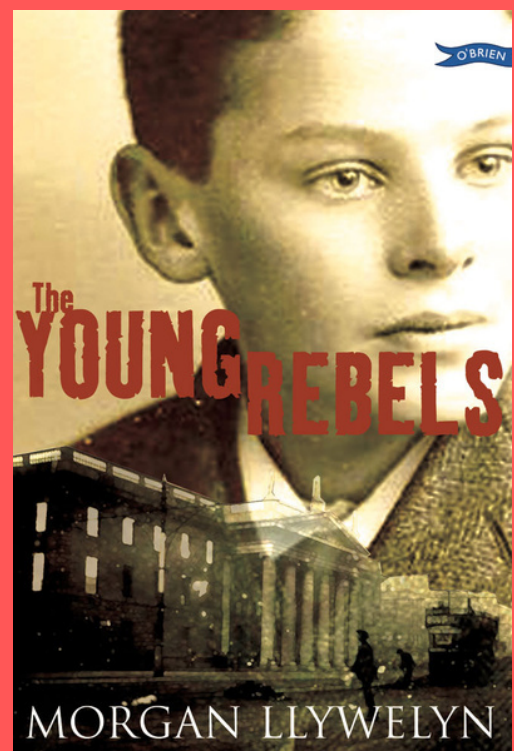
Skulduggery Pleasant *by Derek Landy*

The Young Rebels *by Morgan Llywelyn*

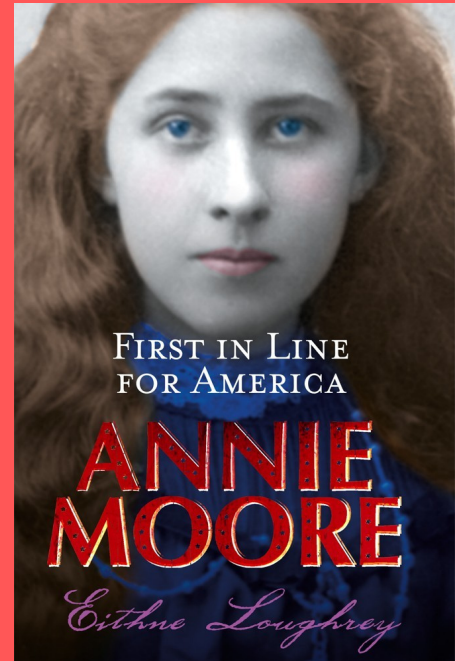

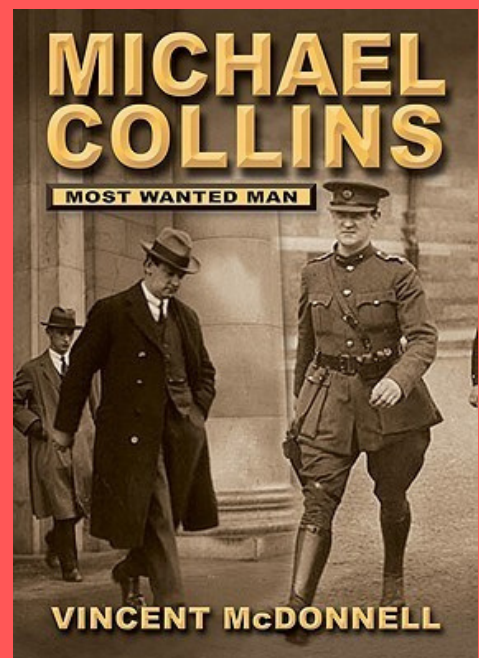
Annie Moore: First in Line for America *by Eithne Loughrey*

Michael Collins - Most Wanted Man *by Vincent McDonnell*

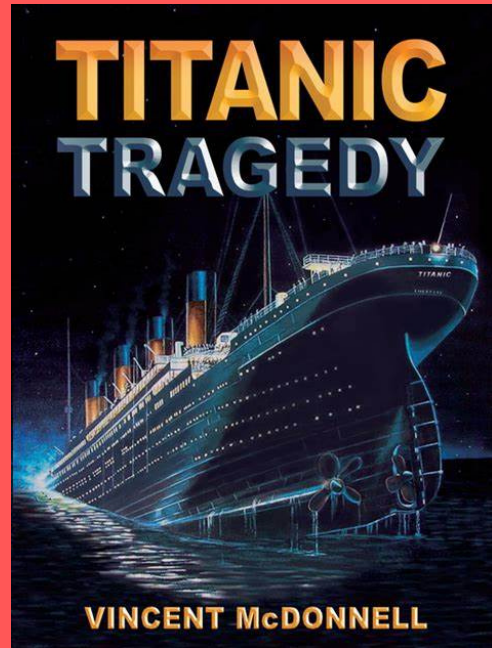

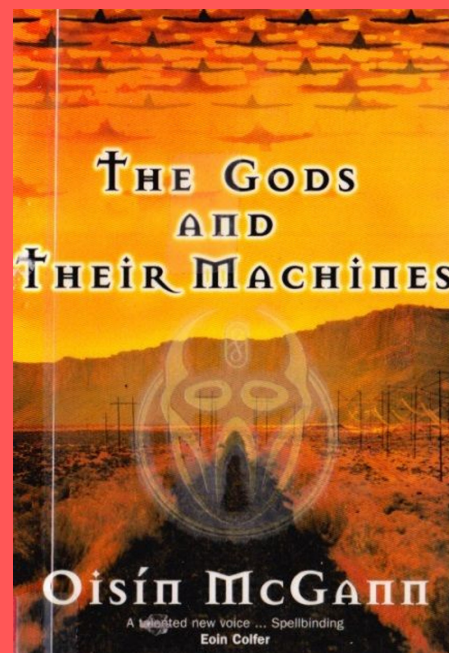
Titanic Tragedy *by Vincent McDonnell*

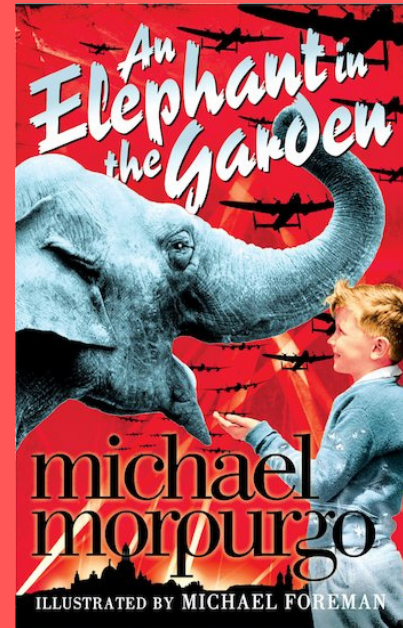

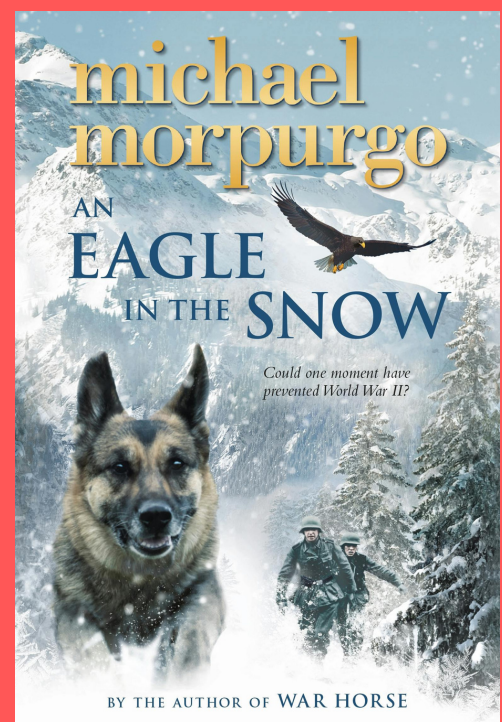
An Eagle in the Snow *by Michael Morpurgo*

And what a story. The story of a young man, a young soldier in the trenches of World War I who, on the spur of the moment, had done what he thought was the right thing.

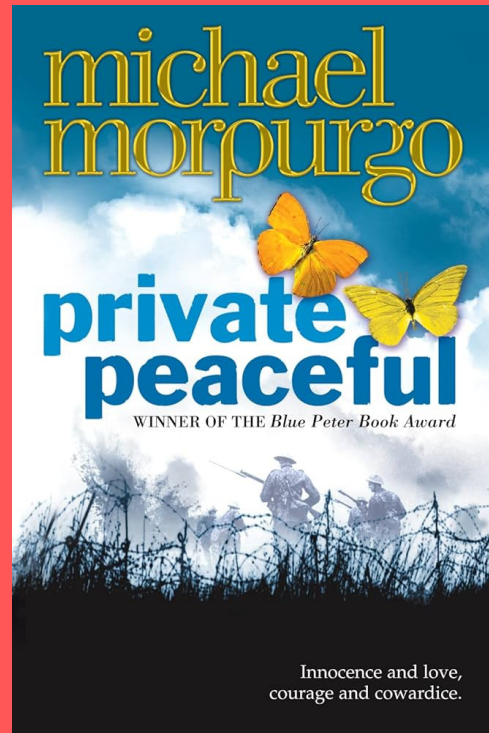
It turned out to have been the worst mistake he ever could have made – a mistake he must put right before it is too late...

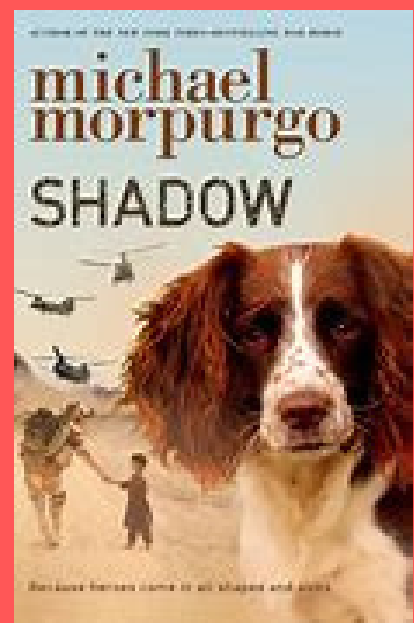
Private Peaceful *by Michael Morpurgo*

Shadow *by Michael Morpurgo*

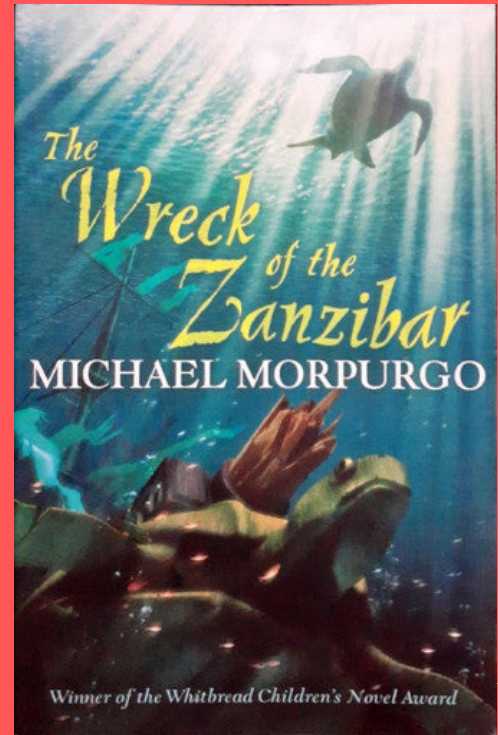

Molly's Diary: The Easter Rising 1916 *by Patricia Murphy*

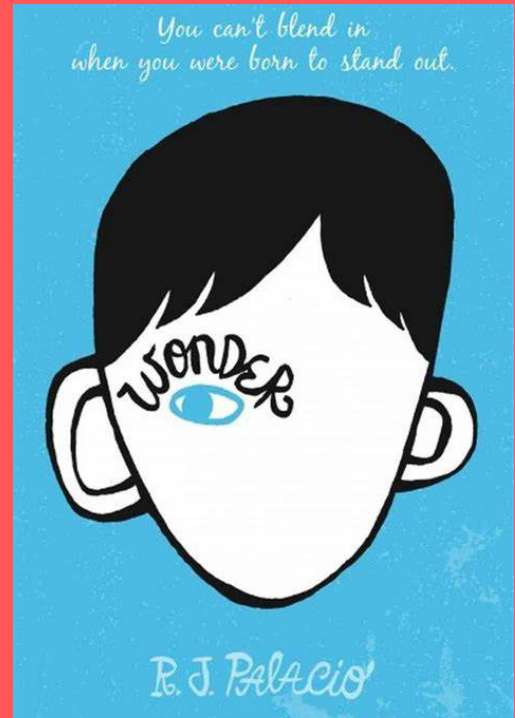

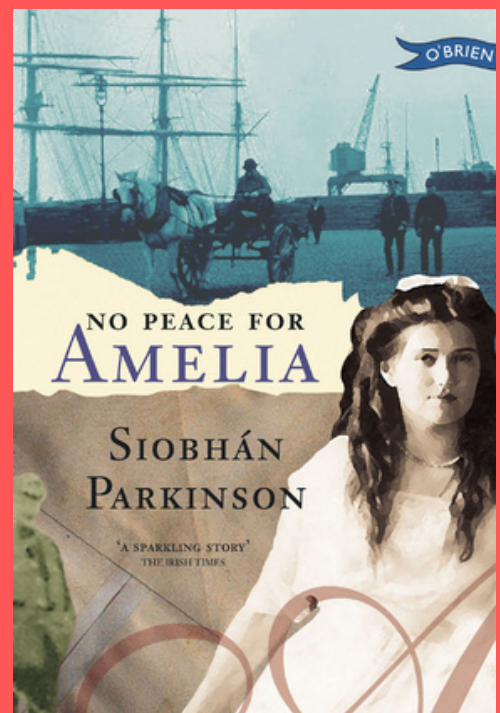
Wonder by *R.J. Palacio*

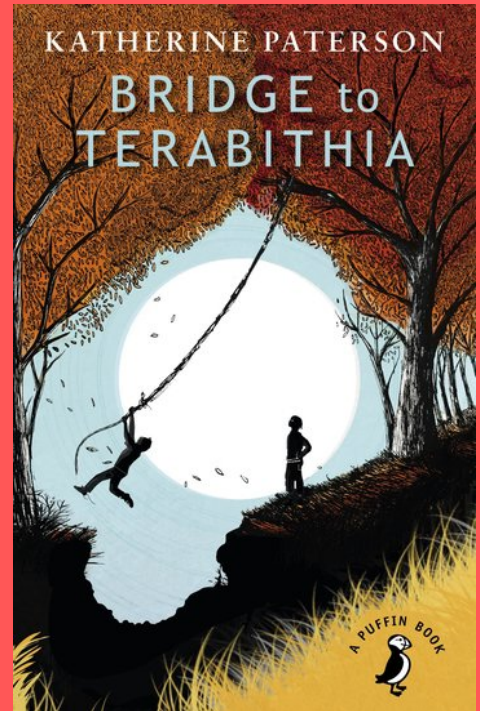

Bridge to Terabithia by Katherine Paterson



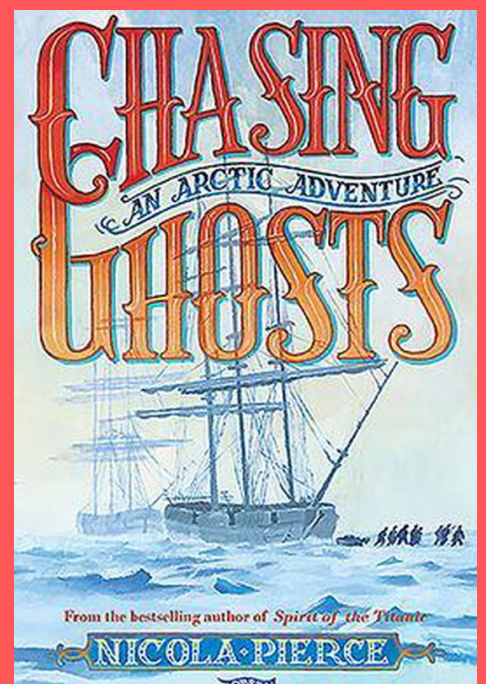

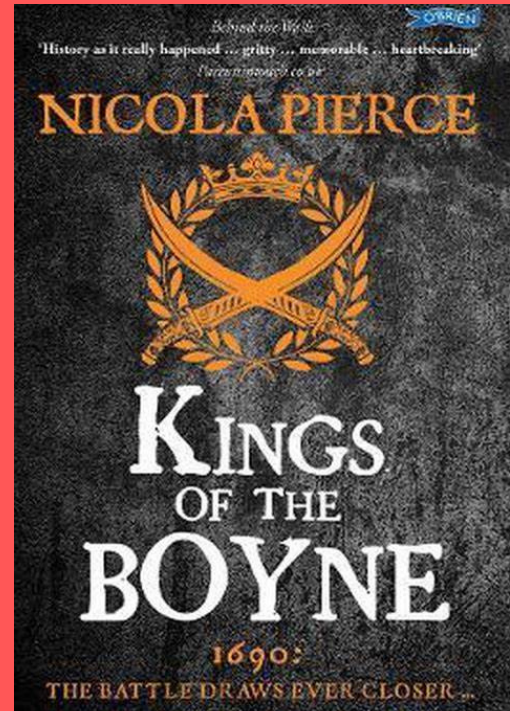

Eager to prove his courage and defend his family honour, young Irish noble Gerald O'Connor rides his warhorse Troy north in King James's cavalry.

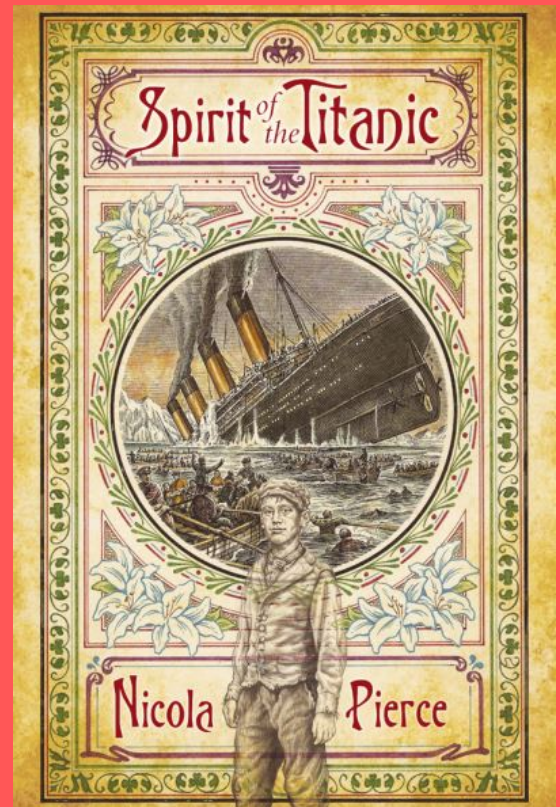
Brothers Robert and Daniel Sherrard march south from the once-besieged city of Derry with King William's army.

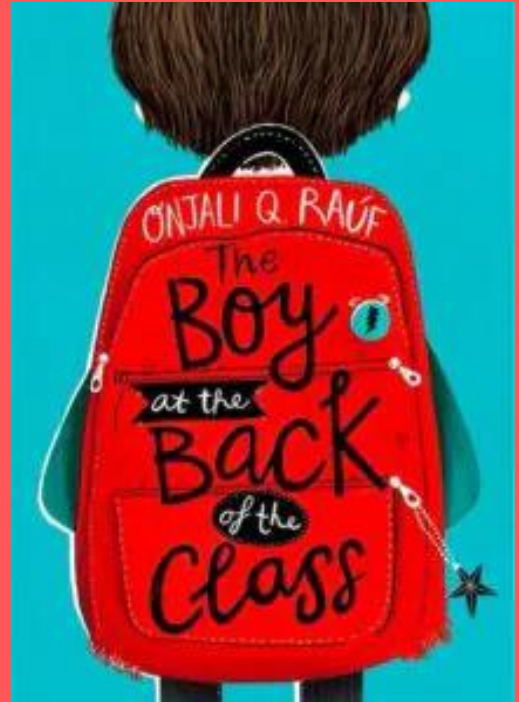

The Boy at the Back of the Class *by Onjali Q. Raúf*

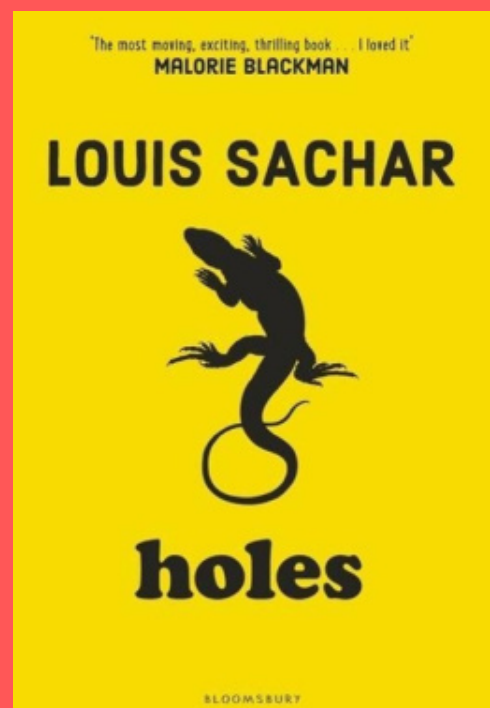

Holes *by Louis Sachar*

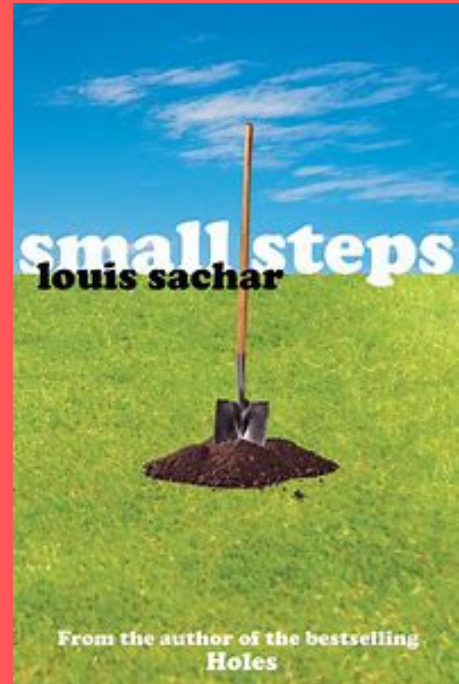

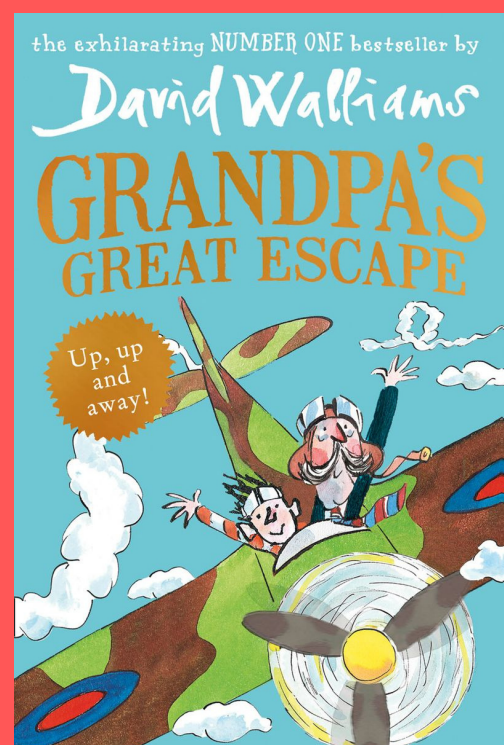


Grandpa's Great Escape *by David Walliams*

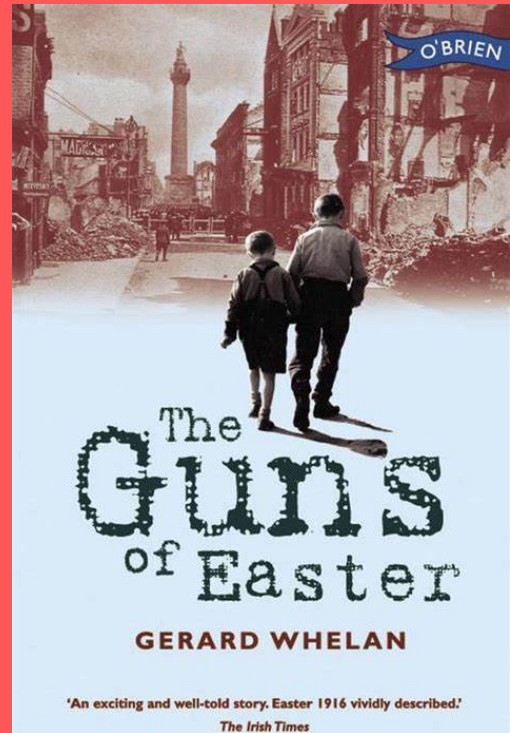

The Guns of Easter *by Gerard Whelan*

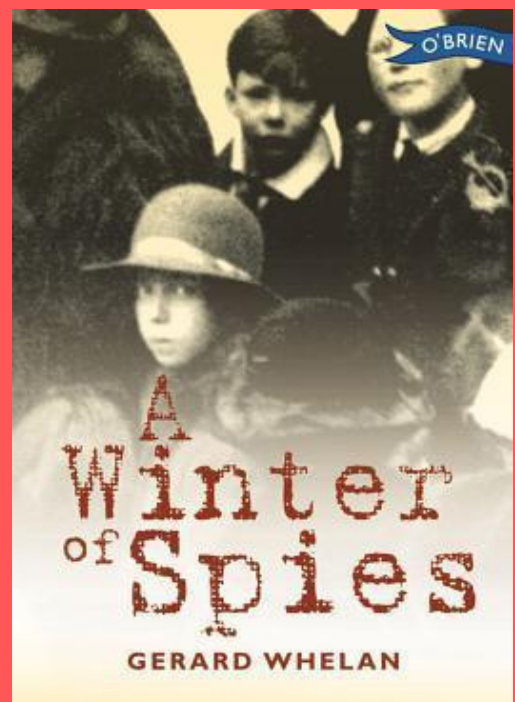

A Winter of Spies *by Gerard Whelan*

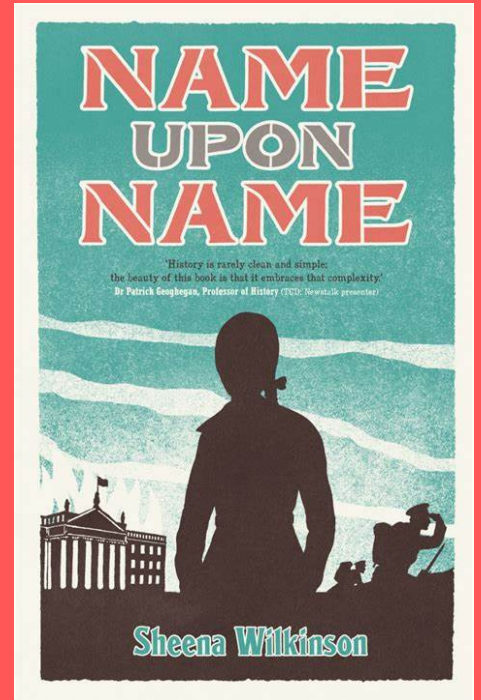

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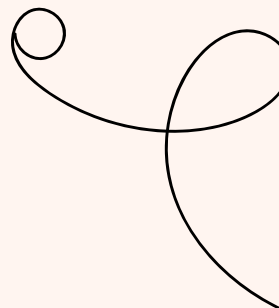
